Indeed, even 20 years after the end of the Cold War agents and informants still feel at ease in this romantic city. With the disintegration of the Austro Hungarian Empire and the political turmoil that followed this led to more and more secret services setting up shop in Vienna.

Siegfried Beer, historian and head of the Austrian Centre for Intelligence, Propaganda and Security Studies: "All the services that were here during the Cold War have a presence in Vienna today." He added, "Between the wars Vienna definitely became the centre of European espionage. Then during the Third Reich the Germans appreciated the city as a place to gather intelligence about Southern and Eastern Europe. After World War II after division into four zones Vienna became a hotbed for agents, informants and double-agents. CIA and KGB agents were at the forefront of intelligence operations in Vienna. As long as they don't spy against Austria, intelligence officers are usually left alone." Beer added, "After the war Austria was full of refugees. Some informants were so desperate they sold intelligence for food or alcohol. When Austria became neutral in 1955 they pulled out a lot of personnel. But they made sure that a certain type of person stayed behind." Beer continued: "Spies continue to swap information and money here as a base to plan covert operations, acts of sabotage and killings. However, not only American and Russian agents played hard at the spying game. There was also a lot of tension between the secret services of Austria on the one hand and the intelligence operations of Czechoslovakia and other Eastern European countries." Today Vienna is an international city and Austrians are really friendly people.

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EXERCISES
