Soldiers, police, medics and a huge number of volunteers were involved in the effort to help rescue over 7,900 flood victims. Local government officials said survivors in makeshift evacuation camps were desperately short of food, water and clothes. Philippine President Gloria Arroyo visited the devastated areas. She appealed for calm and for donations to aid rescue efforts. She described the storm as an "extreme event."

Many survivors had different tales to tell. One spent the night with families trapped on rooftops without food or water. Others were at work and were unable to go home. At its worst people clung to debris as they were swept along the Marikina river. One hero was Muelmar Magallanes who rescued more than 30 people. He sacrificed his own life to save others trapped on rooftops. Mr Magallanes was swept away by the devastating floodwaters. The tropical storm went on to hit Vietnam where it caused more chaos. So far 22 people there have been killed because of the storm that increased its strength to 150km/h. Another 170,000 people were evacuated. Meanwhile the Philippine government has appealed for international foreign aid. Public buildings, universities and the Presidential Palace in Manila have become relief centres. Tents were erected in the grounds of the Presidential Palace. After word of President Arroyo's offer spread people converged on the Palace where they were offered noodles and canned sardines. The situation could become much worse if aid supplies run out. The death toll has risen sharply from the initial figure of 100. Rescue workers continue to pull dead bodies from the mud and swollen river banks. More deaths are expected as the thick mud is cleared from the worst affected parts of the city. Many people in the city have lost everything bar the clothes they were wearing.

LET'S START

Less than 5 is very good. 10 is acceptable. Any more is room for improvement! More than 20 - we need to do some work!

4. Reading: Get students to read the passage aloud. Swap readers every paragraph.

5. Vocabulary: Students look through the article. Underline/highlight any vocabulary you do not know. Look in dictionaries. Discuss and help each other out. The teacher will go through & explain any words or phrases you do not understand.

GAP FILL: Philippines calamity following tropical storm: Torrential rains in the Philippines caused by Tropical Storm Ketsana caused utter devastation across the country recently. One of the worst places to be affected was the capital Manila. It suffered its worst ever **flooding** with more than 80% of the city submerged. More than 246 people were killed. Another 450,000 people were **displaced**. A further 380,000 people ended up in **makeshift shelters**. Telephone and power services to the capital were cut. The government declared a "state of **calamity**" in Manila and 25 provinces on the weekend it struck. This allowed access to emergency funds. Soldiers, police, medics and a huge number of volunteers were involved in the effort to help rescue over 7,900 flood victims. Local government officials said survivors in makeshift evacuation **camps** were desperately short of food, water and clothes. Philippine President Gloria Arroyo visited the devastated areas. She appealed for calm and for donations to aid rescue efforts. She described the **storm** as an "extreme event." Many **survivors** had different tales to tell. One spent the night with families **trapped** on rooftops without food or water. Others were at work and were unable to go home. At its worst people clung to debris as they were **swept** along the Marikina river. One hero was Muelmar Magallanes who rescued more than 30 people. He sacrificed his own life to save others trapped on **rooftops**. Mr Magallanes was swept away by the devastating **floodwaters**. The current was incredibly strong as the floodwaters ripped through the streets. People thought they were going to die. Some officials said rubbish-choked drains and waterways, along with high **tides**, compounded the flooding. The Governor of Bulacan Province Joselito Mendoza said, "It was **tragic** that people drowned in their own houses as the storms **raged**." Some 40cm (16") of rain fell on Manila within 12 hours on Saturday, exceeding the 39cm average for the whole of September. Winds of 100kph hit the Philippines on Saturday crossing the main northern Luzon island before heading out towards the South China sea
