

## The best and worst cities to live in around the world

Today, let's talk about the best and worst cities to live in around the world in 2012. Everyone has their favourites that they might like to live in. The survey by the *Economist Intelligence Unit global "liveability" study*, looked at how "tolerable" it is to live in a particular place given its quality of medical care, its crime levels, its levels of censorship, the threat of conflict, the temperature, its schools and finally its transport links.

The results are extremely interesting, especially when comparing the best and worst cities together. Safe countries like Australia and Canada do well in the survey. Melbourne tops the list. Apparently it is 'the' place to live! Adelaide, Sydney and Perth also make the top ten best cities to live in the world. Canadian cities like Toronto, Vancouver and Calgary do very well. Maybe we should move to these cities? Perhaps Canadians and Australians prefer the big cities to live in, with their good infrastructure and facilities, as opposed to the vast amounts of nothing beyond them. It is good to see safe European cities like Vienna and Helsinki making the top ten. They also offer expats a nice environment and a good quality of life.

It is interesting to compare 'the top ten best cities to live in' with that of 'the top ten spatially adjusted liveability top ten cities to live in'. The results are completely different! Quite why this is - is worth thinking about. Hong Kong tops this list. The place oozes with oriental wonder and is always a favourite among expats. It certainly offers cultural diversity. Yet Amsterdam, which comes in at number two is completely different. It offers expats something rather Dutch! The second survey I think is much more diverse. There are more European cities listed like Berlin, Paris and Munich. Japan still remains a highly popular place with Osaka and Tokyo making the top ten.

The top ten worst cities to live in (listed on page 2) are not so unsurprising. All of the cities in this category are either in South East Asia or Africa. According to the survey Dhaka in Bangladesh is the worst place to live in the world followed by Port Moresby in Papua New Guinea. In third position is Lagos in Nigeria with Harare in Zimbabwe and Algiers in Algeria in fourth and fifth place respectively.

## EXERCISES
